

4 COMPONENTS TO A SUCCESSFUL HUDDLE

1. High Energy Engagement

Begin every huddle with high energy and excitement. The goal is to focus those in attendance and build momentum for the event or service at hand. Consider:

- Clapping
- A short game
- Fun icebreaker questions

Passion is contagious. Make serving on your team contagious!

2. Vision

Vision speaks to why we are here and why what we do matters. It motivates people from “here” to “there” and calls people to participate in it. Consider:

- Wins connected to your team, area of ministry, or Next Level Church
- A quick teaching on:
 - Vision and Core Values of Next Level Church
 - Serve Team Motto – Touch Someone’s Heart Today
 - Mission of Ministry Team or Group
 - The Role and the Win

Invite participation in the vision by ending with a quick challenge connected to the vision.

3. Details

Relay any information pertinent to accomplishing the mission for the event or service. This information should have already been communicated in a previous space and should simply be a reiteration of the details.

Keep this time short and sweet – no longer than a minute or two.

4. Prayer

Seal the huddle in prayer. Remain high in energy, pray over the team, reinforce the vision shared, and invite the Holy Spirit to do His work.

End with a “hands-in” moment as a final rally cry for the team.

3 things to avoid in a huddle

1. Too Many Details

A huddle heavy on details will drag the energy and momentum of the team down.

2. Sad or Emotional Wins or Devos

Huddles should be high energy and vision-filled.

3. Pastoring and Prayer Requests

This is important but should be reserved for time outside of a huddle.
